Big Idea: As the people entered the Promised Land, they were challenged to keep moving forward, enter something new, and always remember. The same challenges face the people of God today.

Key Text: Joshua 3:1; 4:20-24; Exodus 14:15-16; Luke 22:19.

- 1. Why did Joshua and the Israelites start their journey early in the morning?
- 2. What lessons can we learn from the Israelites' choice to begin their journey early in the morning, and how can we apply them to our lives?
- 3. What practical implications can be drawn from the Israelites' decision to start their journey early in the morning, and how can we incorporate them into our daily lives?
- 4. What significance can be drawn from the distinction between the Hebrew words used for "crossing over" in Exodus and Joshua, and how does it relate to the idea of transitioning into something new?
- 5. Can you share a time when you faced opposition and what moves you made to keep moving forward in faith?
- 6. What parallels can be drawn between the Israelites' crossing of the Red Sea in Exodus and their crossing of the Jordan River in Joshua, and how do the differing terms for "crossing over" enhance our understanding of these events?
- 7. How does including children in acts of remembrance, as exemplified in Joshua 4:20-24, reflect the importance of passing on spiritual traditions and teachings to the younger generation?
- 8. How does the act of remembering, particularly in the context of the Lord's Supper, foster a sense of unity and continuity across different generations within the faith community?
- 9. What challenges or considerations should be considered when involving children in acts of remembrance, and how can these be addressed effectively?
